I just want to wish everyone and their families a very Happy Thanksgiving!



2021 CSRG John Morton Cup

First, before anything else is said, "Exciting," immediately followed by "Fun." The Classic Sports Racing Group (CSRG) hosted its 2021 Charity Challenge at Sonoma Raceway over the October 1-3 weekend featuring the John Morton Cup (Group 9, 2 Litre FIA Trans-Am & SCCA Trans-Am 2.5 Challenge Cars & 'B', 'C' Sedans 1966-1979). The pack of 510s has grown to 15 cars including Kristine Casey's Bluebird SSS in the Group 9 field of 29 race cars. We were rooting for ZONC members and friends Rob Fuller (ZCar Garage) and Tom Dockery who raced their 510s for the Morton Cup. Other competing sports cars included 10 Alfa Romeos, only 3 BMW 2002s and a Volvo 142S. This was a race between Datsun and Alfa Romeo from start to finish and would have easily belonged to Datsun except for one little mishap. And there the story begins.

Before the Qualifying Race on Saturday afternoon, I asked Rob how the morning practice went. He said it was good, and his lap times had been improving by a couple seconds. Huge understatement. Rob had the pole position for Qualifying and took off like a rocket from the starting grid. For several laps, Rob was easily ahead of his nearest competitor, the #90





Alfa Romeo GTV driven by Parker McKean of WA. And then Rob disappeared from the pack. We finally spotted his 510 stopped on the drag strip straightaway near Turn 7. It seemed like a long wait until the end of Qualifying when, at the last second, another #7 510 driven by Josh Moriarity of WA passed the #90 Alfa to take the pole for Sunday's race. Back in the pits, we found out that Rob's 510 suffered a broken throttle cable, an easy repair for such a disappointing result with Rob sent to the back of the pack for Sunday's race.

Sunday's Morton Cup race was delayed a bit by a Group 3 Ford GT40 that hit the k-rail with such force that the rail moved and had to be repositioned by heavy duty Big Blue. After extensive clean-up, the races resumed only to have a Group 2 car spew fluids from Turn 11, up through the start/finish straightaway, and just past Turn 1. The track became a slip-n-slide causing an Alfa Romeo Giulia to do multiple spins and shimmies right in front of the grandstand, and just missing the barriers by a slim margin.

Finally, the Group 9 Morton Cup race cars lined up with Rob starting 21st at the very back. The green flag waved, and the #90 Alfa gained the lead, leaving everyone else in the dust. But Rob quickly moved up and by the time he got to Turn 2 from Start, he had passed at least 7 cars. On the next

lap, Rob passed 5 or 6 more, moving up to 8th place, the next lap to 6th, the next lap to 5th, the next lap to 3rd, and then firmly in 2nd place. The announcer said Rob's lap times were so good that he could have been ahead of the #90 Alfa car had he been in a better starting position. In fact, not only did Rob move up from 21st to a 2nd place finish, but he also scored the quickest lap of the race at 1:51.915. Nonetheless, #90 won the 2021 Morton Cup – so it goes on the racetrack. Tom Dockery placed 10th.

CSRG's racing year ends at Thunderhill Raceway on November 6-7 with a banquet and party afterward. If you enjoy historic racing that's accessible and a lot of fun, make sure to catch a CSRG race at Sonoma or Thunderhill. You may be the next one to put on a race helmet and find yourself in a vintage race one day!

My experiences at the 2021 Korbel Hillclimb in a 1973 Datsun 240Z named Zelda

Zelda is a 1973 Datsun 240Z rescued in Sacramento in 1989. It was originally a silver color but was painted Camaro I-ROC Z Ultra-Blue Metallic in 1992 and is now a Corvette Cobalt Blue with flake. It was my daily driver for 20 plus years in Arcata Ca. It's got the 2.4 Liter OHC straight 6 engine with a posi rear end, 1985 280 ZX Turbo clutch and electronic ignition. The 1972 SU carburetors were rebuilt by Simply SU in Eugene Oregon, I replaced the 4 speed transmission with a 1978 280Z 5-speed and get about 25 mpg on the highway. I put in a 4 row aluminum radiator and lightened the flywheel. The 15 x 7 Panasports wheels have been on it since I painted Zelda in 1992.

I have been a member of the Z Owners of Northern California since the Carolyn Dudley era. I moved back to Arcata in Humboldt County in 1995 to run the County's Materials Testing Lab inspecting Public Works projects like roads, bridges, runways and landslide repairs. I joined the Redwood Sports Car Club in 1996 and started autocrossing out on the Samoa Peninsula at the Eureka Municipal airport taxiway. The Redwood Sports Car Club has been around since 1956 and mainly runs autocross races on the Samoa Peninsula. I run my old Datsun in BSP class in the hillclimbs now.

My first hillclimb with the Redwood Sports Car Club and the Northwest Hillclimb Association was the Hoopa Hillclimb in 1998. I ran there 4 more times with the last one in 2019. That hill is 2.5 miles up with some longer straightaways than Korbel. The Hoopa Valley is a special place with great people. Run times there are 2 – 3 minutes long. Due to the Covid-19 pandemic the Hoopa Tribe wisely declined to allow the Hoopa Hill Climb the last 2 years. The

one thing the two hills have in common is lots of poison oak. One nice thing about Hoopa was we would all gather at night at the one motel in town to socialize and go to a fundraising dinner for the senior center.

The July 24th and 25th Korbel Hillclimb course is a 1.3 mile paved hill with trees tight on each side at the upper end of the Mad River Valley in Blue Lake with 609 feet elevation gain. Korbel is where the Green Diamond sawmill is located. There are 2 steep sweeping left hand turns to drift through and several corkscrews spread out through a Douglas Fir forest. Ryan Davis of the NHA ran timing and we are grateful for the NHA. Everybody has missed running the hillclimbs. The work day earlier involved clearing worker stations, setting checkpoints, starting and finish lines and marking cone locations and checking radios.

We had about 28 cars and drivers participate. Ten were local and 18 were from out of the area including Portland, Eugene, Vancouver and Boise. I was grateful for the opportunity to drive Zelda in a controlled challenging place. Other cars ranged from Z06 Corvettes, Tesla 3's, Mazda Miata's, Porsche boxster, Cadillac, Subaru WRX race car, Hondas to a 1924 Model T hot rod. A sleeper car was the 2007 Dodge Magnum R/T station wagon.

Kenny Goldie and the Redwood Sports Car Club did a great job of keeping the hill open to local traffic as much as possible. With 28 cars total and 14 cars each in the morning and afternoon run groups the hill was opened to local traffic about twice an hour. The staging area down at the Loggers Palace was great. The starting line was on a hill so it was a little hard on the clutch inching up to the line. One advantage of Korbel is it's usually not as hot as Hoopa. Hoopa has less tire traction on hot afternoons.

I was pleasantly surprised that California Historical Marker # 164 "The Old Arrowhead Tree" is about halfway up the Korbel hill. Native Americans from probably Yurok, Hupa and Wiyot tribes would shoot an arrow into the tree at certain times when they passed. Hay bales were placed around the base. It was hard to admire it much passing by at speed. I barely had time to glance at my tachometer while focusing on what was coming up. I was driving near redline by ear.

My work station both days was the Top of Hill soft closure

Why do I own a Datsun?

My Z Journey began when I first started driving in 1974, so you might say that I am an early Z adopter. Our High School P.E. teacher doubled as our driving instructor, and while we were learning to drive Dodge Monaco Sedans, his daily driver was a 112 Yellow (Lime) '73 240z. I asked him what he thought of his car, and he responded: "It's the best car I have ever owned." That's all I needed to hear, and soon found myself at the local Daland Datsun dealership in Millbrae California. There on the lot was a '72 240z, 4-speed, white-on-red, with 33,000 miles on the clock. The dealer reluctantly took me out for a test drive and this 15-year-old was forever hooked. Great styling, smooth power delivery, a flawless gearbox and only two seats, which thankfully guaranteed that my car would NOT be chosen to endlessly cruise with my buddies on Friday's and Saturday's, usually ending with an interior filled with spilled drinks and food. That honor was reserved for Chevelle's and Trans Am's.

When did I acquire my Datsun 240z?

My current Z is a '72 240z, 4-speed, 110 Persimmon Red, white interior, acquired 5 years ago, with a California only history. I wanted a 1970's time machine that I can use as a weekend driver, with the operative word being "use", because in my humble opinion, Z's are meant to be driven. My car with 92,000 miles runs better than the 3-year-old Z I drove off the dealer lot back in 1974. It feels good to be back in the 70's, even if only on weekends.

Hope to see other Datsun owners on the road in the S.F. Bay Area.

station. I guess I was up there to distract people with the 240Z and give them a heads up for the road closed barricades around the next corner. There was not much traffic and everybody was patient. One local named Austin showed up with his 1975 280Z to compare Z cars.

My 1st three run times on Saturday were about the same at 110 seconds and then I went faster by 2 seconds on my 4th run. I was peeking around the corners at speed until I was halfway familiar with the turns. The second day my best run time was 3 seconds faster than my first day at 105.478 seconds. I didn't know if I could improve much the second day. Corner numbers put out on the second day helped. This is a new hill to everybody. I think only 2 cars went off course with minor damage. The weather was clear and mild with some early low clouds.

Zelda has good handling and new tires but needs more power. I've been chasing a 2019 Subaru black BRZ. He had a time of 98.732 seconds compared to my dawdling 105.478 seconds while the Tesla 3 cranked out 78.689 seconds up the hill.

Kenny Goldie handled the award ceremony. He handed out several trophies for class wins which were a portion of large sawblades. Most people were the only one in their class. They handed out a smaller piece of saw blade as a trophy to us single class drivers. Everybody had fun and it was only a 15-minute drive home at the end of the day. Thanks to Total Image Embroidery for the event T-Shirt.
